# Former Staffer Appointed to White House Position

### The Do No Harm Act Would Undermine RFRA

When religiously grounded beliefs inspire us to take actions that conflict with other interests and rights, how should the government respond? For more than two decades, the U.S. has relied on the Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA) to balance religious freedom with other government interests, such as LGBT and reproductive rights. On June 25, 2019, the House Committee on Education and Labor held a hearing about a new bill, the Do No Harm Act, which would undermine RFRA and erode religious freedom protections. This draft bill has sparked strong reactions from both sides of the aisle, reigniting the religious freedom debate. RFRA is a neutral balancing test that requires courts to weigh religious freedom with the government's interest in protecting other rights and come to a fair determination. Note: Citygate Network legal counsel Jonathan Ruybalid notes: "The Do No Harm (DNH) Act of 2019 has been introduced in both the House and Senate. The Senate bill has been referred to the Senate Judiciary Committee but that committee has not taken any action. The House version of the bill was introduced and was the subject of a June hearing in the Committee on Education and Labor. However, it is pretty glacial pace for DNH." Citygate Network will continue to carefully watch this issue on your behalf.

City Officials Repeatedly Play "Baby Shark" to Keep Homeless People Out of Local Park "Baby Shark," the popular and repetitive hit children's song, is being used in a campaign to drive homeless people away from a Florida waterfront park. Officials in West Palm Beach, Florida, are temporarily playing "Baby Shark" and another children's song, "Raining Tacos," on loop overnight in an effort to keep homeless people away from the Lake Pavilion—an event space on the city's waterfront. According to an article in USA Today, West Palm Beach parks and recreation director Leah Rockwell told the Palm Beach Post that the plan is a temporary solution that will give way to a more thorough plan to introduce formal hours to the waterfront park. That, she said, would allow police to enforce trespassing laws more easily.

# Administration to Reduce Length of Opioid Prescriptions for Federal Employees

The government's employee health plan will tighten its rules for covering prescription opioid painkillers starting this fall, the Trump administration said Monday. The announcement by a senior administration official was part of a White House drug policy briefing. The official spoke on condition of anonymity under the media coverage rules established for the event. The Federal Employee Health Benefits Program is the world's largest job-based health plan, covering an estimated 9 million people, including workers,

retirees and family members. According to an <u>article</u> from Stat News, patients dealing with intractable pain from diseases such as cancer will still be able to get opioid painkillers, but the new policy is geared to preventing over-prescribing to people who might just need the drugs for a short period of time. Under the new policy, the initial prescription will be for a seven-day supply, instead of up to 30 days, the official said. Patients will be able get up to three refills of seven days apiece.



### Study Finds Millennials Tend to Donate More to Charity—But Do It Less Often

Time magazine once described Millennials—those born between 1981 and 1996—as the "me me me generation." But new research examining charitable behavior has failed to find convincing evidence that Millennials are less giving than previous generations. According to an <a href="article">article</a> from PsyPost, researchers analyzed data from the Philanthropy Panel Study, which included information about the charitable behavior of nearly 15,000 U.S. households for every other year from 2001 to 2015. Researchers said, "There is no simple way to characterize the donative behavior of the Millennials relative to their generational predecessors. On the one hand, they are less likely to make any donations at all, other things held constant. On the other hand, those that do make a donation give more, again, holding other things being the same."

# How Poverty Is Defined Depends on Household Size

For many people, being poor feels more like an identity or series of experiences than a measure of income. People may feel poor if they've overdrawn their account at the grocery store or spent nights sleeping in the car. They may feel poor if their parents were impoverished or if they can't afford new clothes or a good education. But the definition of poverty also goes beyond a feeling or experience. According to an <u>article</u> in *US News*, the official poverty rate was 12.3 percent in 2017. The U.S. Census Bureau says an under-65 individual with no kids falls under the poverty level at \$12,752 in annual income. That number increases as household size increases. A four-person household with two children under 18 years old reaches the poverty threshold at \$24,858.

# World Bank Study Finds That Deregulation Reduces Extreme Poverty

Regardless of where an individual might live around the world, if he or she lives on less than \$2 a day, they would be considered to be living in extreme poverty. According to the World Bank, in 2015, about 736 million people around the world—or just under 10 percent of the world's population—had incomes that put them below this international poverty line. Believe it or not, that is extraordinarily good news because poverty rates

around the world have fallen dramatically since 1981 when 42 percent of the world's population lived on an inflation-adjusted \$1.90 or less per day. According to an <u>article</u> by World Bank economists studying this decline, in the nine years from 2005 through 2013, the extreme poverty rate was cut nearly in half from 21 percent to 11 percent. They state that much of this reduction in global poverty came about because of deregulation, as governments around the world have been reducing the regulatory burdens they impose on their citizens.
